


Fig. 1. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values





Fig. 2. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values




Fig. 3. Forward current as a function of forward





Fig. 6. Average forward power dissipation as a function of average forward current; typical values












Fig. 11. Reverse recovery definition; step recovery




Fig. 12. Reverse recovery definition; ramp recovery





Fig. 13. Forward recovery definition






